MOHSIN SCHOOL HEALTH EYE CARE PROJECT

CHILDHOOD BLINDNESS:

- 1. Causes of blindness in children are different from adults.
- 2. Project and Prevention of adulthood blindness will not help relief of childhood blindness.
- Small eyes, difficulties in examining eyes of children necessary for special equipment like Mobile, automated refractive meter, mobile funds camera, mobiles litlamp etc. and in some cases necessity for general anesthesia for eye examining them.
- Delay in recognition and treatment, may lead to amblyopia and disturbance of psychomotor development.
- 5. Child has longevity for life & has to live with disability for life long.
- 6. Emotional, Social & Economic factors come into play.
- 7. Morbidity and mortality.
- 8. Affects ultimately on education / occupation / social lifedevelopment.
- 9. Over 90% of blind children receive no schooling, no education, no training, and no jobs when they grow up, they depend upon others lifelong.
- 10. Majority of visual impairment and blindness in children are preventable, treatable and some are curable.
- 11. There are difficulties in accurate assessment of visual function in children below 2 years. A variety of

methodologies are necessary for examining some children.

- 12. Significant number of children with visual impairment also have other systemic disabilities which complicate accurate assessment of visual function full rehabilitation, recovery some cases not possible.
- Definition of Childhood: Age between 0-15 (both years inclusive) is childhood.
- Screening:
- 1. Simple non invasive, in expensive methods should be used.
- 2. Screening should be done under the following Age groups.
- a) Examination of the newborn for eye and adnexal abnormalities and detection of pupillary reflexes, red reflexes, microphthalmos, cataract, buphopth almos and colobomas.
- b) Screening of premature children with low birth weight and rule out retinopathy prematurity and initiate treatment as soon as possible.
- c) Examination of higher age groups with hereditary and congenital disorders.
- d) Preschool children should be examined for refractive errors squints, media, and optic nerve and retinal diseases.
- e) School children should be examined by school teachers, volunteers and optometrists with proper training.

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

STAMP COLLECTING: THE HOBBY OF KINGS

Stamp collecting has today become one of the most popular hobbies in the world. Philately is 'The King of Hobbies and Hobby of Kings as many Kings and Queens pursued this hobby with keen interest. Stamp collection gives not only enjoyment but also it increases our knowledge. It disperses boredom and gives full-time engagement and enjoyment. These tiny bits of papers take you to distant countries and view beautiful landscapes, wildlife, flowers and architectural wonders. Each stamp, with its intricate designs and vivid colours, tells a story-a snapshot of a nation's identity, a commemoration of significant events, or a tribute to influential figures. Stamps are messengers of International good will, peace and a medium of communication of culture, literature, religion, science, commerce, history and industry. A stamp album is one of the few places where nations stick together peacefully. Philately demands treating stamps with respect, realising their value, studying their context, keeping them safe, and enjoying it

The world's first adhesive postage stamp, the Penny Black?was issued in Great Britain on May 6, 1840. Rowland Hill is the father of the adhesive stamp. By 1860 almost every country adopted stamps as a method of paying postal charges.

In the present stressful world, stamps and it study or collection gives a soothing or relaxing experience. Philately is not only a subject of art but also a science in itself. This unique hobby develops the 'Five Hs' namely Head, Hands, Heart, Habit and Health.Post & Telegraph Department have contributed tremendously towards the growth of this hobby

Stamps come in different designs, colors, shapes, themes, and sizes. It is not only just the stamp that is important even a cancellation or postmark on an ordinary stamp can often increase its value. Stamps are proved safe investment, easily transportable and a hedge against inflation. A specialist in stamp collecting with knowledge through vast reading and research can make considerable amount of money on stamps. The amount spent on stamps is worth better than some of our so-called amusements and gambling.

Some details about stamps

Mint stamps are those that do not have cancellation or postmark. Their value is their face price.

Used stamps have cancellations that deface the stamp and prevent its reuse. These have less value. Postmarks have date and location details.

A souvenir sheet or miniature sheet is a postage stamp or a small group of postage stamps still attached to the sheet on which they were printed.



First-day covers (FDCs) - envelopes with stamps attached on the first day that the stamp was issued. They bear designs called "cachets", related to the theme of the stamp issued.

A maximum card (also known as a maxi-card, or maxicard) is a postcard with a postage stamp placed on the picture side of the card where the stamp and card match or are in maximum concordance (similarity). The cancellation or postmark is usually related to the image on the front of the card and the stamp.

Commemorative stamp/card: Issued for a nationally important event

Revenue/Fiscal philately is the collection of stamps used to collect taxes or fees like legal documents, court fees,

Cinderella stamps - stamp-like labels that are not valid for postage

Types of collections

Thematic or Topical:Thematic collection deals with classifying and arranging the stamps on the basis of themes or topics like festivals, roses, big cats, ships, trains, famous leaders etc.

Temporal classification: As per period e.g. pre independence

Spatial classification: classifying the stamps according to the country which has issued the stamp

An album is a convenient way to store stamps; to avoid damage. Stamp tongs help to handle stamps safely, a magnifying glass helps in viewing fine details. Stamps should be stored away from light, heat, and moisture or they will be damaged.

How to start a collection?

ith the exception of Great Britain all postage stamps must have the name of the country of issuance on them. (As the first country to issue postage stamps Great Britain may simply have a silhouette of the ruling monarch.) However, the country name will not necessarily appear in English or even resemble the English name

When you get a few stamps, you can classify them and store them in an album carefully without bending or folding the stamp or damaging it's edges, called perforations. If stamp is stuck on a cover, place the envelope with stamp face down in the tray, completely submerged in water.Let it soak for 10-15 minutes then gently rub the paper around the stamp edges to loosen.Once stamp releases, use tweezers to transfer and position onto a paper towel to dry.Finally, mount stamp once completely dry.

When your collection grows, you can classify them time to time in this way. There are many ways to grow your collection. You can ask your friends and acquaintances to give you the stamps they get. If you have any friends who get a lot of mail, especially in office, you can request them to collect the stamps and give them to you. If any of your friends have an active stamp collection, you can exchange stamps with them. If you have more than one copy of the same stamp, you can give it to your friend and request him/her to give another stamp in exchange. You can become member in stamp clubs where people interested in philately come together and exchange stamps. You can also become member of online communities. Finally, if you are considering philately as a serious hobby, you can buy stamps as well.

Philately is a window to the world. Each stamp carries with it a tale and is an ever-evolving educational journey. Discovering a rare stamp or completing a thematic collection can be a thrilling experience. The meticulous process of arranging and cataloginga collection offers a meditative escape. Stamp collecting is not just about accumulation; it's about appreciation, learning, and, most importantly, passion. Happy collecting!

The Dark Side of the Digital World: Understanding Cyber Crimes

The rapid growth of the internet and technology has transformed the way we live, work, and interact. This digital revolution has also given rise to a new breed of crimes, cyber crimes.

These offenses exploit vulnerabilities in computer systems, networks, and online social platforms, posing significant threats to individuals, businesses, and governments.

Types of Cyber Crimes

1. Hacking: Unauthorized access to computer systems or networks to steal sensitive information or disrupt operations.

Example: The 2017 Equifax hack exposed personal data of 147 million people.

2. Phishing: Fraudulent emails or messages that trick victims into revealing confidential information.

Example: Scammers sent fake emails posing as PayPal, stealing login credentials and financial information.

3. Identity Theft: Stealing personal data to impersonate victims and commit financial fraud.

Example: The 2013 Target data breach compromised 40 million customers' credit card information. The Target data breach of 2013 is considered to be one of the largest data breaches in the history of the United States. In December of 2013, credit card numbers of almost 40 million customers were stolen from 2000 Target stores around the country by accessing data on point of sale (POS) systems.

4. Ransom ware: Malware that encrypts files, demanding payment for decryption.

Example: The 2017 WannaCry attack affected 200,000 computers in 150 countries.

5. Cyber Stalking: Online harassment or threats that intimidate or harm victims.

Example: The 2014 Gamergate controversy highlighted online harassment and threats against women.

6. Online Fraud: Scams that deceive victims into financial transactions or revealing sensitive information.

Example: Nigerian Prince scam, where victims receive fake emails promising inheritance. The Nigerian prince scam is a type of email scam that involves people posing as Nigerian royalty who ask for financial assistance and promise to repay the money

7. Denial of Service (DoS): Overwhelming websites with traffic to disrupt service.

Example: The 2016 Dyn DNS attack took down major websites like Twitter and Netflix. The attack targeted Dyn, a company that services a large share of the internet's domain name system (DNS) infrastructure, and lasted for most of the day.



8. Social media Cyber crimes: Facebook, Instagram -Fake profiles.

Last but not the least and one of the major play ground for fraudsters to cheat young and old on face book, Instagram with false identities, false advertisements and false promises and Many get tempted and fall victim to such crimes and frauds on social media.

Real-World Consequences- Cyber crimes have severe consequences, including:

1. Financial loss: Billions of dollars lost annually to cybercrime.

2. Reputation damage: Companies suffer irreparable harm from data breaches.

3. Emotional distress: Victims of cyber stalking or identity theft experience anxiety and trauma.

4. National security threats: Cyber attacks compromise sensitive government information.

Prevention and Protection to safeguard against cyber crimes:

- 1. Use strong, unique passwords.
- 2. Enable two-factor authentication.
- 3. Keep software and operating systems updated.
- 4. Be cautious with email attachments and links.
- 5. Use reputable antivirus software.
- 6. Monitor accounts and credit reports.
- 7. Educate yourself on online safety.

8. Do not befriend unknown persons on Face book etc - the profiles may be fake.

Law Enforcement and Cyber Security


Governments and organizations are combating cyber crimes through:


