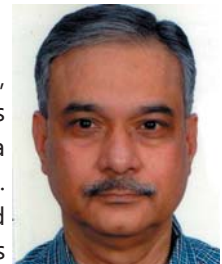

Why play Bridge



At the recently concluded Asian Games in China, India participated in the Men's, Women's, and Mixed Bridge tournaments, winning a silver medal in the Men's tournament. Yes, Bridge! In case anyone is wondering, this card game is a recognised "sport" requiring mental skill, and yes, it is also played in our Club. Bridge is basically a trick-taking card game using a standard 52-card pack and played by four players in two competing partnerships, but the simplicity ends there. There is virtually no limit to the level one can reach in this sport. There



are more than 750 trillion possible hands!

Lakhs of people play Bridge round the world, whether at home, at clubs or online where one can partner with or play against other players from around the world 24 hours a day with tournaments that last just 30 minutes. While Bridge is more popular amongst seniors, there is no age when it cannot be played. At the recent HCL Nationals in Delhi there was a pair consisting of two brothers aged eight and eleven! Warren Buffet and Bill Gates are Bridge fanatics.

If you are interested in learning Bridge, come to the Bridge Room between 04:30pm and 7:00pm on most days where you will find players ready to help you learn the game and develop your skill.

Do note that while card games involving betting are not permitted in Andhra Pradesh, Bridge is a sport so there is no restriction! Once familiar with the game, there are many online applications where one can login and play for free from anywhere one has a smart phone and an internet connection.

Playing bridge is one of the few games that stimulates both the left and right sides of your brain and recent research has suggested that it may keep away degenerative diseases such as Alzheimer's. It is the best way to practice the "use it or lose it"

advice for maintaining mental sharpness in older age. Bridge is also social where you interact with other players with a focus on teamwork and ethics. Bridge is great fun and Bridge is exciting! It offers the suspense of poker, the cerebral qualities of chess and the excitement of athletic sports, all in a sociable setting. It takes only basic knowledge to start playing Bridge but impossible to master and that is precisely why bridge is so popular, and why it's called "the game for a lifetime". Bridge can be exciting, challenging, frustrating and humbling, but it will never be boring. All you need is a pack of cards and three other people. To call Bridge just another card game is like calling Everest just another mountain! Wait no longer, start playing now.

At the time of researching articles for the Waltair Club Coffee Table Book, the Editor Dr. Hema Yadavalli, decided to trace the history or background for a photograph of the first President of Waltair Club - HR Farmer, 1891.

The quest to find Henry Richard Farmer First President of Waltair Club starts with records that he was born on 29 Nov 1845; his father was a Church of Ireland clergyman who was Rector of Donaghmore, Queens County, Ireland. He was schooled at the prestigious Uppingham Grammar Boarding School in Rutland, England and the school magazine of 1863 records that HR Farmer would be attending Trinity College, Dublin.

He appeared for the Indian Civil Service (ICS) entrance exam in 1867 and was ranked in the middle of the group. The higher ranks and those who studied Urdu or Sanskrit were appointed to the North India Presidencies and Princely States. Mr Farmer had topped his class in Tamil and was appointed to the Madras Presidency.

On 4 December 1868, he arrives in Madras on P&O steamer Simla to start his appointment in the Indian Civil Service and is assigned Assistant to the Collector and Magistrate for Coimbatore, then 1871 Assistant District Judge in Chinglepet, in 1879 Tamil Translator to the Madras Government, 1883 Sub-Collector in Cuddapah, and then Trichinopoly, and as the District and Sessions Judge in Travancore in 1887. There were no photo albums or diaries of events in the many South India postings, where HR Farmer would have been present at the Governor's official visits to give us any images for our quest.

HR Farmer married Margaret MacDonald on 27 March 1879 in Birkenhead while he was on furlough in England, had children Edward James, Donald William and Margaret all born in Ooty. Family photo albums are generally a good source for pictures for our quest, so we tracked each of his

children and their families with no luck. His only daughter first married Lt Phillips of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers and she was widowed early after outbreak of World War 1. She applied herself to the welfare of servicemen with the YMCA on the battlefield in France and was awarded a Member of the British Empire (MBE). In 1919, she remarried in Cologne Germany to Col Vernon Munro Colquhoun, CMG, DSO. HR Farmer's sons migrated to Canada and there are no records of any grandchildren or family records.

Appointed to Collector and Magistrate in Vizagapatam in 1891, HR Farmer becomes Vizag's leading citizen and is duly appointed President of the fledgling Waltair Club. The Club is the centre of British social life in the garrison

Arrived 4th December 1868. Assistant to the Collector and Magistrate of Coimbatore, 15th December 1868. Assistant Collector, Bellary, from 3rd May 1870. In charge of Head Assistant's Office, Bellary, from 19th May to 18th June 1870. Assistant Collector and Magistrate of Chingleput, from 10th January 1871. Acting Head Assistant of North Arcot, from 10th May to 12th July 1872. In charge of Sub-Collector's Office, Chingleput, from 5th to 29th August 1872. Assistant but Acting Head Assistant, Kurnool, 10th April 1873. On furlough to Europe, from 18th June 1877 to 27th June 1878. Assistant Collector and Magistrate, and Acting Sub-Collector and Joint Magistrate, North Arcot, from 7th July 1879. Acting Sub-Collector and Joint Magistrate, Chingleput, from 4th August 1879. Assistant Collector and Magistrate, Chingleput—31st October 1879.— 9 years, 16 days.

Silver-gilt Flora.—To Messrs. Blackmore and Langdon, Bath, for begonias; to Lady Hill, Rookwood, for a group of plants; to Messrs. J. Cypher and Sons, for a group of plants; to Messrs. R. Wallace and Co., Colchester, for hardy flowers.

In the class for 12 Japanese blooms, dissimilar, the 1st prize was won by Mr A. CHANDLER; 2nd, Mr. WOOLMAN; 3rd, Mr. TATE.

For 24 Incurved blooms, in 18 varieties, the 1st prize was won handsomely by the Marquis of BUTE, Cardiff Castle (gr. Mr. H. R. Farmer), who showed splendid specimens, his best flowers being Edwin Thorpe, Le Peyrou, a seedling, Wm. Biddle, Eclipse, Nellie Threlfall, Embleme Poitevine, Clara Wells, Romance, Mrs. F. Judson, and Ma Perfection. The 2nd prize was won by Mr. TATE, whose best blooms were Edwin Thorpe (premier Incurved flower), Duchess of Fife, Mrs. F. Judson, Clara Wells, Pantia Ralli, and G. Denyer; 3rd, PANTIA RALLI, Esq., Epsom (gr. Mr. G. Hunt).

TRADE AND HONORARY EXHIBITS.

A gold medal was awarded to the Marquis of BUTE (gr. Mr. Farmer) for a group of stove and greenhouse flowering and foliage plants.

Silver medals were awarded to the following exhibitors:—Mr. MAURICE PRICHARD, Christchurch, for a collection of herbaceous cut flowers; Messrs. DICKSONS, Chester, for a group of miscellaneous cut flowers; Messrs. CLIBBANS, Altrincham, for Sweet Peas; Mr. I. HOUSE, Westbury-on-Trym, for herbaceous cut flowers; KING'S ACRE NURSERY Co., Hereford, for a collection of fruit trees in pots; and Mr. JONES, Kilkenny, for Gladioli and Sweet Peas.

Cardiff Gardeners' Association.—This society opens its winter session next Tuesday, when Mr. Garbold will lecture upon "British Residences and Gardens," illustrated with limelight views. The syllabus promises a long and attractive programme extending over twelve meetings. Among the subjects to be treated may be mentioned "Sweet Peas," by Mr. J. C. House; "Chemical Manures on Fruit and Kitchen Garden Produce," by Mr. F. W. Shrivall; "The Rock Garden," by Mr. W. W. Pettigrew; and "Peaches and Nectarines," by Mr. H. B. Farmer. It is to be hoped that the good work of this society will bear fruit a hundredfold by promoting the emulation of its excellent example.

town where the East Coast Battalion officers joined with their European friends at the newly created East Coast State Railway Company to enjoy their hours of leisure. There are no photographic records except records of HR Farmer's legal work and a paper he wrote in the Saturday Review 1894 'Report on the System of Trial by Jury' about communal dynamics dividing jury decisions regardless of the evidence and other judicial decisions.

HR Farmer retired on 22 June 1896 and settled in Gateacre Park, Bridgnorth, Shropshire, UK where he became a very proficient horticulturalist and active in the Shropshire Horticultural Society. Mr Farmer was a regular speaker to other horticulturalists on subjects ranging from chrysanthemums to 'Preserving Fresh Fruit & Vegetables by Bottling'. HR Farmer

is quoted in many magazines of the day namely The Garden, The Gardners' Chronicle & New Horticulturalist, The Gardeners Magazine and the Horticultural Trade Journal. As most of these magazines are digitised, a systematic search for an image of HR Farmer followed. The archivists of the Shropshire, and the Royal Horticultural Society were engaged, without success, to get some background.

HR Farmers reputation grew in Shropshire, he became a Fellow of the Royal Horticultural Society (FRHS) and there are reports of Horticultural Society meetings he presided on, and competitions he judged and those at which his blooms won prizes.

He was given the honorary title of Head Gardner to the Marquis of Bute who owned Cardiff Castle and had the gardens redesigned into a tourist showpiece that it remains today.

Then followed a useful lead in our quest. In 1910, HR Farmer was Chairman of the Cardiff & County Horticultural Society, and a Garden Show was held in the grounds of Cardiff Castle. The archives of the Museum of Wales were consulted. In Cardiff, he held a prestigious position, in a prestigious organisation, for a prestigious event, with prestigious guests. Surely there were records of this to aid our quest for the elusive HR Farmer. And patience in fishing pays off as we land our big catch!

His obituary records that 'the death occurred on June 22, 1919, at Cliaford, Devon, of Henry Richard Farmer, Indian Civil Service (retired), of Gatacre Park, Bridgnorth, in his seventy-fourth year'. His name proudly leads the Honour Board of distinguished citizens of Waltair who have had the privilege to be President of the Waltair Club. Lest we Forget!

ART THERAPY

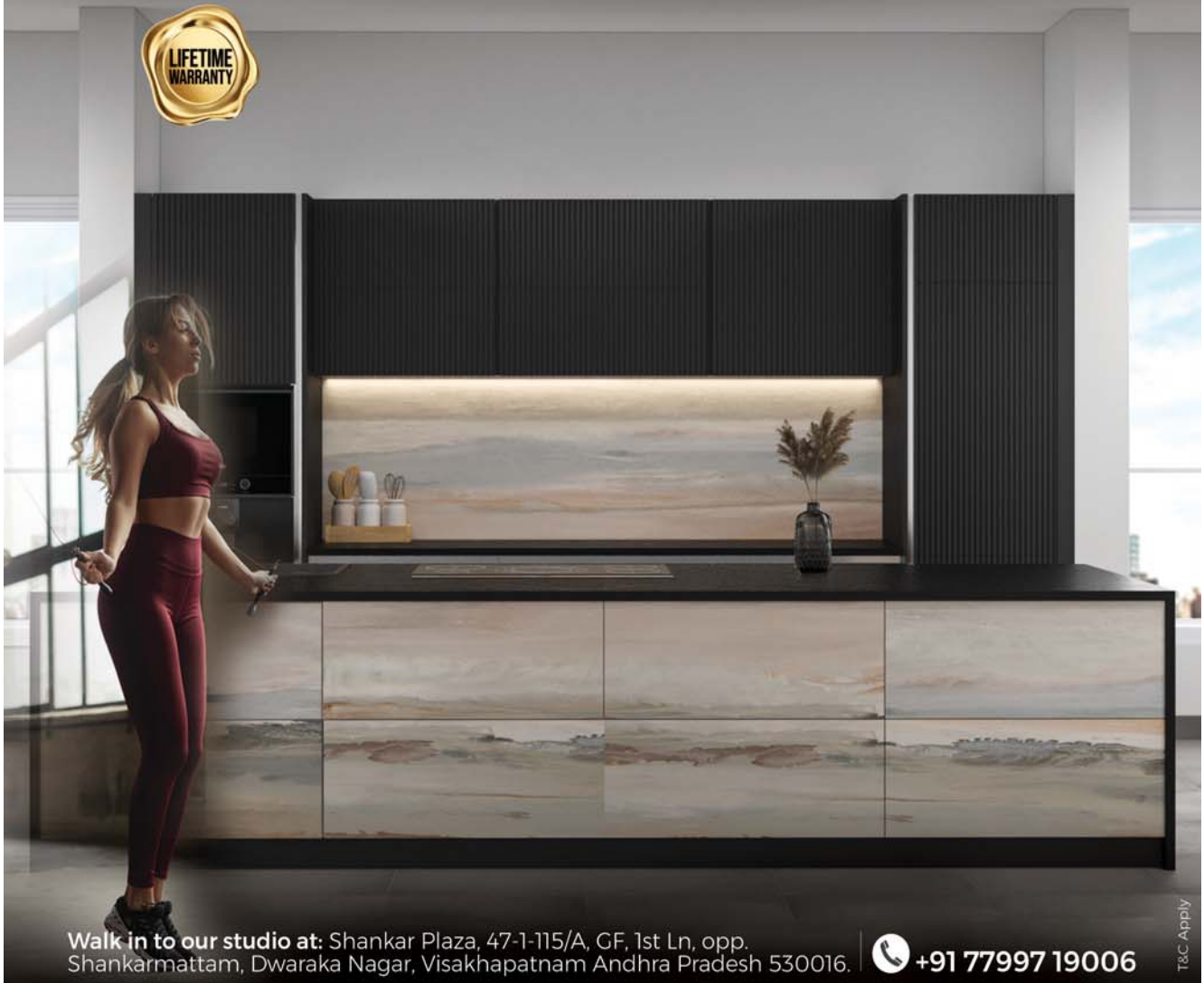

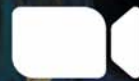
